



Patient Information: Breast Surgery

Procedures	Lumpectomy & Mastectomy
Incision Care	Remove any dressing(s) in 48hrs. The incision(s) may be sealed with staples, a skin adhesive (Dermabond) or covered with white adhesive tapes known as steri-strips . Either way, there is no need to cover up the incisions again with gauze.
Bra	Wear a soft bra at all times for support (after 48hrs, you may remove it to shower & to sleep).
Drain Care	If you go home with a JP drain, please measure & record the daily output . Call our office if the output is less than 30ml over 24hours to have it removed prior to your follow-up visit. Wash around the drain site gently with soap & water or peroxide daily. Apply a small amount of antibiotic ointment to the drain site daily & cover with a light gauze.
Shower	You may shower 48 hours after surgery & get the incision(s) or steri-strips wet with soapy water and gently pad them dry. If the steri-strips come off in the shower, do not become concerned. If they are still in place 10 days after surgery, you may remove them.
Pain Medications	You will be given a prescription for a narcotic pain medication (usually Lortab or Percocet). Options for non-constipating pain medications include products that include Ibuprofen or Tylenol. To combat constipation, you may take a stool softener (Colace) twice each day.
Activity & Driving	Do not do any heavy lifting (more than 5 pounds) or vigorous exercise for 6 weeks . You may be given instructions on special exercises to do at home. No driving for one week or while taking pain medications.
Diet	You may eat anything you desire. If your throat is sore, try eating soft foods.
Return to Work	You may resume work in 1-2weeks .
Physician Appointment	Call (941) 744-2700 to make your post-operative appointment to see Dr. Bunch or Dr. Erbella in 1 week or if you have any questions.
Pathology Results	It normally takes 4-5 working days to process the tissue by our pathology lab. This usually works out well so we can review your pathology with you on your follow-up visit.
When to call your Surgeon	Persistent fever over 101.5 degrees F (39 C). Pain that is not relieved by your medications. Persistent nausea or vomiting. Persistent cough or shortness of breath. Purulent drainage (pus) or bleeding from any incision. Redness surrounding any of your incisions that is worsening or getting bigger. If you are unable to eat or drink liquids.
In Case of Emergency	Your surgeon is available 24hrs a day. You may call either our office (941) 744-2700, your nearest emergency room at Blake, Lakewood Ranch or Manatee Hospitals or Dial 911.
